Twenty years later, my yard is still a work in progress. As tempting as it sounds to have the world's most perfect and pristine garden, where is the fun in that? I like trying new plants, seeing what works where, and frankly, just getting dirty. The biggest joy, however, is in the garden club experience, with the fellowship and trading of ideas with other gardeners. You are my inspiration.

TO APPLY FOR THE DOTTIE HOWATT FLOWER SHOW GRANT

We are now accepting applications for the Dottie Howatt Special Flower Show Grants for 2023-2024. This grant is open to all Delaware Garden Clubs and Maryland District 1 Garden Clubs.

The grants of \$1,000 are awarded for the first five garden clubs that apply. The sole purpose of the grant is to help fund an NCG Standard, Small Standard or specialty Flower Show consistent with the Current NGC Handbook for Flower Shows. The application must be submitted no earlier than 18 months or less than 12 month from the date of the actual Flower Show.

Environmental Concerns: Conserving Water in the Kitchen

The following is found on the city of Newark, DE household conservation web page.

Try to do one thing each day that will result in saving water. Every drop counts.

- Do not waste water waiting for it to get hot. Capture it for other uses such as plant watering or heat it on the stove or in a microwave.
- Instead of letting the water run when hand washing dishes, use a dishpan or fill the sink with water. Also use less soap for less rinsing.
- Never pour water down the drain when there may be another use for it. Use it to water your indoor plants or garden.
- Running the dishwasher and washing machine with full loads can save 1,000 gallons of water a month.
- Store drinking water in the refrigerator. Don't let the tap run while you are waiting for water to cool.
- Thaw frozen food in the refrigerator or microwave, not under running water.
- Use a bowl of water to clean and prepare vegetables, rather than letting the faucet run.
- Use your garbage disposal less often and compost instead.

Founded in 1964, Delaware Nature Society (DelNature) is a state-wide, environmental nonprofit organization, working to protect the environment and connect people to nature for **60** years. DelNature delivers hands-on environmental education programming in Delaware with staff at four sites: Ashland Nature Center, DuPont Environmental Education Center, Coverdale Farm, and Abbott's Mill Nature Center. Over 2,000 acres of land, including four nature preserves are managed and conserved by DelNature.

To celebrate the 60th Anniversary and build strong connections between people and the broader natural world, these themes are identified as important and urgent. Activities and events are designed to recognize each of these themes.

Much work has already been accomplished for our joint upcoming Flower Show: THROUGH THAT DOOR which will be held on Saturday June 15, 1:00-4:00. Moonflower Garden Club and Countryside Garden Club will be pleased to see many DFGC members attend in June. The planning team has submitted a schedule and has made (we hope) final revisions. Our flower show chair Ann Perry has shared tips about hosting and submitting specimens to a flower show at each of our meetings. Ann is a founding and life member of Moonflower, a past president of DFGC and a veteran flower show organizer.



Another interesting part of each of our meetings is Garden Talent Tips. Two members share some tips which could be about a specific houseplant, a specific outdoor garden plant, design information when planning a new garden or enlarging a current one, sustainable ways to deal with pests, composting, delicious varieties of a veg to plant for harvest. This is very open and it is always nice to include all members' voices. Everyone has some tips to share.

In October, Barb Borleske, founding and life member of Moonflower and president of The Delaware African Violet and Gesneriad Society, led a challenge workshop. We each got cuttings of <u>Nematanthus</u> and made a mini-growth chamber in which the cuttings would grow roots.

In November, Brigid Gregory of Plastic Free Delaware gave us an interesting presentation on Food Scrap Composting 101. 25% of what Delawareans send to the landfill is food waste, which produces methane which, we all know, is a harmful greenhouse gas. She was an engaging speaker and provided time for our questions.

In January, we needed to pivot from the program in our yearbook. Our knowledgable gardeners Barb Borleske and Ann Perry put together a program to inform us about the flower show. Part 1: everyone



could bring 1 plant and these 2 experts gave tips on grooming and making the plant "showready". Part 2, slides from a previous flower show and the judge's comments about the designs and horticultural specimens.

Our most recent meeting will be led by Marcia Kelly, a life member of Moonflower. She will

show a video and discuss "Roses Other Than Knock-Out". Which roses are suitable for the mid-Atlantic region? Which roses will do well with our humid summers? What are benefits of some newer varieties?









Annual Harvest Dinner and Fundraiser-October 20, 2023












Plantation Lakes Garden Club



Garden Gate Garden Club



Garden Gate Garden Club has elected to participate in the National Garden Club's *Plant America-Feed America* project. On December 13, following our club's monthly meeting, Garden Gate delivered 65 pounds of fresh vegetables and fruit to the two community refrigerators at REACH Riverside and Kingswood Community Centers in northeast Wilmington.

Plant America - Feed America is designed to fight food insecurity by encouraging garden clubs across the country to donate food to those communities which are food insecure. The Riverside neighborhood of Wilmington is a low income community with a median income of less than \$10,000, for those in subsidized housing, and roughly \$25,000 for those in non-subsidized housing. Riverside is now being transformed thanks to substantial public and private investment to create: mixed-income housing, a cradle-to-college education pipeline, and community wellness.

Garden Gate Garden Club will stock these two community refrigerators on a monthly basis, joining a broad cross-section of community organizations seeking to support this neighborhood. We also contribute food and clothing monthly to Sojourners, a local residential program that assists homeless men and women on their journey to self-sufficiency.



Garden Gate celebrated it's 60th anniversary, exactly to the day, of its founding. We feted ourselves with an elegant luncheon, a visit and words of congratulation from DFGC President, Ginny Cordona, beautiful garden-themed cupcakes, and a Prosecco toast. Past President Paula Hill was presented with an honorary DFGC lifetime membership.

Other fascinating programs included a field trip to a lovely natural garden in Villanova, on the lands of the Lenape Indians. The property has been placed under conservation easement with Natural Lands ensuring that this beautiful place will be preserved. Cat Meholic, founder of the group Women in Horticulture and now Director of Gardens and Horticulture at Hagley Museum, conducted a program

describing plant and animal life that she has observed while residing on the 500-acre property, Granogue, formerly a DuPont family estate. Our latest program was a presentation by Sarah Rafferty, founder of Atwater Designs, during which we learned of the cyanotype process and saw a number of her creative botanical works on paper. We all were very excited by her energy and creativity and hope to follow up on our plans to visit her studio for a class.

This month we had a trip to Delmar to visit one of the only biodynamic farms on the Eastern Shore. Our hostess lives off the grid and grows only organically seasonal plants, seeds and nuts, dried food and herbs. In addition to getting to know her ducks, geese, chickens and a horse. She shared her experience with herbal medicines, tinctures and crafts made from the vines, herbs and weeds on the farm as well as her methods of composting and organic and biodynamic gardening methods. We had a gorgeous spring day for our trip and enjoyed the fresh air and sunshine and being outside.

Our entire club is now preparing for our semi-annual auction to be held at the end of April. Our theme is a blast from the past - Flower Power. We are including for the first time a Chi Chi She Shed - a garden shed with garden related art, books, tools, containers, tote bags, pots and vases and garden objects. We will enjoy, i.e. rock out to, familiar music of the 60's and many are planning to dress in wild colors and clothes that will harken back to the 60's. Here come bell bottoms, tie dyed shirts, big hair, granny dresses and blouses, headbands, beads, birkenstocks, etc. If you can attend, please come on along and join us on April 26th - a flyer of the event is included in this newsletter.


an October visit to Stoneleigh- the newest local estate (Villanova, Pa.) focused on growing native plants for biodiversity.
